Father Pro

As we enter into the life of Padre Pro, we discover his importance as a man and as a Christian.

The "little priest" was committed to the poor whom he loved and served, and whom he called, "Pro's people."

During the persecution of the Church in Mexico, he had to adopt disguises and show great ingenuity in his attempts to conceal the fact that he was a priest.

This was all done so that, risking his own life, he could respond to the call of his "souls" and assist them with courage and good humour.

Why did they kill him?

On 13th November 1927, an attempt was made to assassinate the former President, General Obregon. Padre Pro and his brothers were accused of complicity in the crime, arrested and jailed.

When the real perpetrator, Luis Segura Vilchis, learned of this, he handed himself over to the police. He told them that the Pro brothers had played no role in the assassination attempt. But, even so, they were not released.

Subject to false accusations, without any proof of their alleged guilt, and in the absence of any trial, the then president, Plutarco Elias Calles, ordered Padre Pro and his brothers to be executed by a firing-squad on 23rd November 1927.

On that day, Padre Pro emerged from his cell to find the yard filled with soldiers and people who had been "invited to the show". Photographers and members of the diplomatic corps were present.

He came out, walking calmly, and as he did so, he heard one of the soldiers say, "Father, forgive me."

Not only do I forgive you. I thank you

-Not only do I forgive you, I thank you.

Then they asked him his last will

-To pray to God, my Father.

He knelt down in front of the crowd and, with his arms stretched out in the form of a cross, he spent a few moments in recollection, offering his life for the salvation of Mexico and the conversion of his persecutors.

He then stood up, opened his arms again in the form of a cross and shouted:

Long live Christ the King and after receiving the impacts he fell to the ground, where, seeing that he was still breathing, he was given the coup de grace.

Father Pro today

Father Pro is a symbol of the vocation to faith and struggle for the respect of dignity and human rights promoted by the Jesuits through the Miguel Agustín Pro Juárez Human Rights Center A.C.

Faithful Mexicans were quick to proclaim Padre Pro a martyr. He was beatified by SS John Paul II on 25th September 1988. The Church now hopes and asks God for a miracle to take place through Padre Pro's intercession so that his canonization can proceed in Rome and he be declared a saint.
